"No Stone Unturned" An Empty Homes Initiative for London



Introduction

London faces growing problems of housing supply and affordability. With tens of thousands of long-term vacant dwellings – and many more thought to be unreported¹ – the opportunity for a credible London-wide empty homes initiative is real. We know that this won't, on its own, solve London's housing crisis. But by taking a strong lead to tackle empties, London can shows it means business, that no stone will be left unturned in the drive to provide sufficient housing.

May Elections

Empty homes are not a party political issue. Politicians from across the spectrum take the issue seriously – as does the public. ² But the May elections do provide a useful opportunity to take a fresh look at old problems: 2016 offers an ideal opportunity to develop an empty homes initiative worthy of London's status as a world-leading city, an inspiration not only for the rest of the UK but for cities around the world.

The Empty Homes Network

Nearly every empty homes practitioner in the country belongs to the Empty Homes Network. Our proposals draw on a wealth of experience about what works (whilst also keeping a careful eye on what doesn't work). Our members have decades of experience in researching, developing and delivering empty homes strategies at local authority and in some cases cross-boundary levels.

Why a London Empty Homes Initiative?

There are diverse reasons why homes sit empty. The barriers to re-use are often difficult to surmount. This means that tackling empty homes is a specialist task. It needs skilled practitioners, who are adept at negotiating and familiar with a wide range of tools. But individual local authorities often don't have sufficiently focused teams to deliver what is needed: communities face a postcode lottery and local action can be ineffective. This is why a London-wide initiative is required.

A London-wide initiative can make big improvements in the effectiveness of empty homes work in the capital by providing

- the necessary leadership to drive up the standards of empty homes work
- the impetus to ensure delivery at local level
- **replicable models and templates** to improve **efficiency** and **quality** in the shaping of schemes,
- a source of **expertise** able to be deployed across the city.

Kent's No Use Empty initiative³, Scotland's Empty Homes Partnership⁴ and Wales's Houses to Homes⁵ initiative all demonstrate the value of cross-boundary approaches. But the strength and scale of London's regional government offers the opportunity to exceed what has been achieved elsewhere.

Financially, not only do London boroughs gain New Homes Bonus from more effective empty homes work but also 20% of the New Homes Bonus earned via bringing homes back into use is hypothecated to the projects of the London's LEP (the London Enterprise Panel).

What it could mean in practice

- a clear, written action plan with targets and priorities attached, identifying available resources and laying out the relationship between a possible London Empty Homes Unit and the London boroughs
- a London-wide **empty homes loans scheme** (modelled on the proven schemes in Kent and Wales) aimed at private owners, with optional nomination rights to local authorities
- a source of loan finance at preferential rates via Public Loans and Works Board or Municipal Bonds Agency
- a London-wide empty homes hotline for reporting empties and for owners seeking advice for re-use; and London-wide advertising of available interventions
- a specific delivery stream under the London Enterprise Panel tailored to support community-led self-help housing schemes that deliver training, volunteering and employment opportunities, such as those run by World Habitat Award Winners Canopy and Giroscope⁶.
- funding for DIY Home Ownership models (i.e. homesteading) including shared ownership options – directed towards publicly- or privately-owned empty homes
- effective regulation of Property Guardian schemes to ensure that the potential for short-term re-use of empty buildings is met, whilst driving up standards and driving out cowboys
- a central advice and service centre providing access to the skills or advice needed to
 progress the more complex eyesore cases that blight communities, via compulsory
 purchase, Empty Dwelling Management Order or enforced sale
- effective engagement with public or private sector providers that can include Londonwide procurement of services needed to support empty homes schemes such as property management, building surveying, legal processes for CPO, etc.
- continuous monitoring and regular evaluation to tune and improve the initiative
- support for options that connect empty homes interventions to the provision of affordable housing
- support from London to individual boroughs predicated on **strong local strategies**.

Appeal To Candidates

We invite the candidates in the May elections give the proposal for a London Empty Homes Initiative serious consideration and make such commitments as they can to implement one if elected. We are willing and able to help lay the groundwork for such an initiative.
